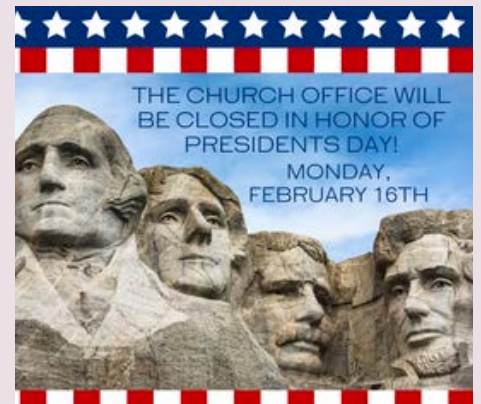

OUR LENTEN JOURNEY BEGINS
WEDNESDAY, FEBRUARY 18TH

LENT

There will be NO Ash Wednesday service due to Pastor Kirk's vacation.

Daily Lenten Devotionals Will Be Available to Prepare Your Heart During This Important Season of Reflection

"...he sent them out to proclaim the kingdom of God and to heal the sick. He said to them, "Take nothing for your journey: no staff, nor bag, nor bread, nor money—not even an extra tunic." - Luke 9:2-3

The first sermon I heard about the opening to Luke Chapter Nine contended that Jesus told the Apostles to discard all extra things as a symbolic cleansing. They went out to preach, heal, and restore under the power of God so they needed to discard accumulated possessions. That sounded good and I believed it for many years - until a professor pointed out the items to leave behind weren't "possessions" as we think of them, they were necessities. Which of us travels overnight with only one set of clothes? Who in ancient Israel would have walked every day for months in old sandals? In our abundant culture, "decluttering" may be a virtue. In contrast, foregoing supplies on a long journey in the first century was foolhardy.

Another possibility is that Jesus banned the symbols that helped people identify their home, family, and class. Every group had a different way to decorate their clothes, adorn their bags, and indicate their social place. By telling the

Apostles they couldn't carry anything and had to rely on their daily tunics and one pair of sandals - which would soon show signs of wear - Jesus was weakening their association with distinct groups. It's like telling a Bills fan they can only go to a game in a plain t-shirt and jeans with no hat; no one could tell if you supported Buffalo or the opposing team!

This had obvious advantages as the Apostles traveled to places where their past affiliations were unwelcome. Every group had friends and enemies; if you wanted to proclaim the Gospel to all, it's best to eschew the totems that might arouse opposition.

Yet the larger message was simply that those past associations were no longer what defined the twelve Apostles. In choosing to follow Jesus, they constituted a new group, and that group provided all the identity from that point on. When they set aside their best outer tunics,

their adorned bags, and even walking sticks made in their hometowns, they clearly belonged to God. And in belonging to God, they could be welcomed into homes everywhere, and sit down at table with anyone.

For us today, it might help to ensure our possessions don't possess us; ownership of certain commodities is often intended to make statements that shut out others rather than open us to serving them in Christ's Name. Yet even that isn't the ultimate question of this passage. That question is: to Whom do I belong? How do I show that devotion? The means of expressing our faithfulness to God in Christ might be very different from that of the first Apostles. Yet the process of shedding old layers of identity to reveal our inclusion in God's Family is very much the same

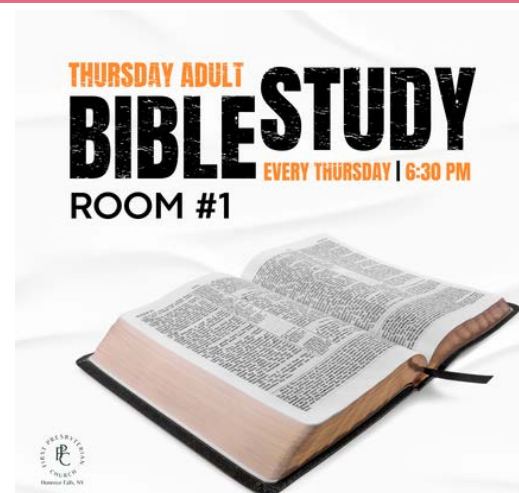
PC USA Office of Public Witness Issues Call to Churches

The Office of Public Witness (OPW) is one of our denomination's many committees formed by local Church Elders from around the country. They often put out statements on different areas of need. In November they put out a Call to Churches that was supported by over 220 theologically-diverse congregations and our Synod and Presbytery. The call refers to the treatment of peaceful protesters in Broadview, Illinois and other relevant areas. The Session discussed the call and in the tradition of the Westminster Confession's assertion that "God alone is Lord of the conscience" (WCF 20.2), chose to summarize it in the monthly Glad Tidings.

Though videos of immigration officers shooting the Rev. David Black with non-lethal pepper balls in the head and of the Rev. Hannah Kardon pinned and zip-tied while kneeling in prayer have evoked strong, emotional responses, the OPW stresses that objections to ICE tactics is not limited to treatment of pastors. Dozens of peaceful protesters have been gassed, restrained, and detained by ICE while on public property. First responders were targeted when they tried to help others, including over two dozen Broadview Police Officers.

The OPW objects to the unnecessary and excessive use of force by immigration officers and asks for prayerful acts of support (below):

- Participate in peaceful protest by joining rallies, marches, petitions, and lawsuits;
- Lobby legislators;
- Connect with the PC USA Office of Public Witness in D.C. for updates;
- Write letters to local papers and use social media;
- Call upon military leaders to refuse immoral and unlawful orders;
- Contact your state and national legislators to express support for lawful immigrants.

Worship In February ***Lent Begins February 18***

When the Early Church moved away from the Hebrew Calendar of Feasts, the Bishop of Rome would announce which Sunday to commemorate the Christ's Resurrection each year, trying to capture the first Sunday when spring would begin to show in that part of the world. As the Roman Empire declined, communication problems led to the adoption of one Sunday that might coincide with the first Mediterranean harvests - based on a lunar cycle. Today we still use that system, placing Easter Sunday on the first Sunday after the first full moon on or after the spring equinox. This means that special Sunday - the most important one on the Christian Calendar - can fall over an unusually wide period. Because Lent and Pentecost fall relative to that Sunday, so can those seasons. This year Lent begins on February 18. Unfortunately, because I'll be occupied during Aiden's and Liam's February school break, I won't be available to lead an Ash Wednesday service this year.

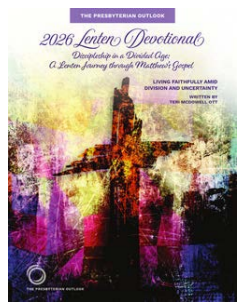
We'll look at some themes central to historic Christian teaching this year, with noted Lectionary passages for key dates in Lent, and later in Holy Week.

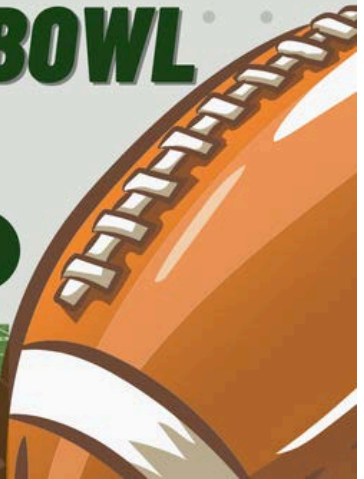

The Fellowship Team hosted a game night on Saturday, January 17, and a great time was had by all. The night was a big hit—except, of course, for the Bills' loss!



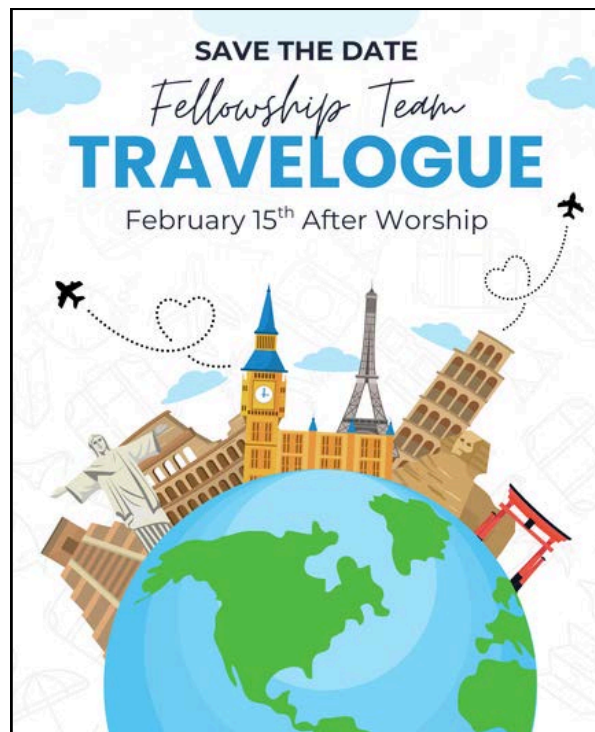
Join Us At the Table for Dinner

Teazaar 2025 "Positives"

With Teazaar 2025 expenses accounted for, we have reported that our net profit was \$7,927.88! In addition, in January, we were blessed with a special donation of \$72.12 from a community member with a note that it was designated for Teazaar to "round up" so our total proceeds would be an even \$8,000.00. The note acknowledged that the giver knew that it was after the closing of our books for 2025, so she said it could be used for "seed" for next year. We appreciate this thoughtful gesture!

As we have always done, we will be sharing funds with local and other charitable organizations and mission projects as well as assisting with church and other needs brought to our attention. We often help our Building and Grounds Team with projects that may not be in the scope of their annual budget. We also support events and projects that other church Teams take on as well. We hope that you will read our 2025 Financial Statement that was included in the church's 2025 Annual Report that is available at church or through Cheryl, our Office Manager. You will be able to see all of our charitable and other disbursements for 2025.

To add to the Teazaar "positives", the Gingerbread House was very busy on Teazaar Day and their profit of \$523.50 showed that! Take-Out Soups (13 makers this year) took in \$630.00. So, a total of \$1,153.50 was deposited into the Middle and High School Youth Fund! That total is \$184.50 more than last year.

We could feel that attendance was much higher than other years. We all know that advertising an event is a key factor for attendance. Some "elves" deliver posters to area businesses or post Teazaar information on Craig's List and YNN. Behind the scenes, our Office Manager, Cheryl Farnham, plays a key role in our advertising. She has designed things for us, printed our worker sign-up sheets, made signs, copied and laminated for us. Cheryl makes certain Teazaar information is "out there". She submits the Pennysaver Hometown Events listing, e-mails our poster to many area churches and she sends information about the Teazaar to be included in the Presbytery E-News. Our Facebook presence the last few years has also been key to making sure people know about the Teazaar. Starting in November, Cheryl makes sure timely information about Teazaar and the Gingerbread House is posted on Facebook as does Bob Richardson. Bob has taken a video of the Teazaar room a few days before to show people what the room looks like and what we offer. Two weeks before the Teazaar, he "blasted" our neighboring town Facebook groups along with our own town group with our poster. This year he also filmed and posted a video with one of our helper "Elves" proudly showing and describing things in the Gingerbread Room. He updates our church website with Teazaar details. He also takes makes date changes on our vinyl banners and yard signs and he makes sure they are visibly placed ahead of the Teazaar and then retrieved after. **A BIG THANK YOU TO CHERYL AND BOB!!**

Each volunteer, workers, makers, bakers, buyers, makes a difference in the success of the Teazaar! We can't emphasize enough our gratitude for those who have always made it a priority (**some for many years**) to help in one way or another and to those who helped this year for the first time!

We are SO very grateful to share our wonderful 2025 "positives" due to the efforts of so many!!

Hope? Among the Ashes - A Church Library Book Review



This is the first of a series of semi-regular reviews on books that can be found in our church library. Gail R. and Donna H. meet regularly on Monday mornings via messenger to do Bible studies or read related books. We've been moved to share books that are currently in the library. We've been working on Richard Rohr's "Tears for Things, Prophetic Wisdom in an Age of Outrage" (future review) and were instructed by Rohr to read/reread the Book of Job. In reading Job, and looking at related readings, we were led to the 1959 Pulitzer Prize winning play J.B. by Archibald MacLeish.

J.B. is a play that places the story of Job in a post-WWII setting. It is a quick, but hard read. It assumes that the theatre goer has at least some knowledge of the Book of Job. The initial focus is the relationship between God and Satan, incarnated as two circus snack sellers. The play then goes into the Biblical story, focusing on the agony of losing one's children to circumstances beyond one's control in more detail than the Bible. The friends appear and offer their traditional viewpoints on why bad things happen to good people, in poetry that inspires a deep look at one's own beliefs.

Does the play end the same as the Bible? That's for you to find out. Borrow it from our church library or the public library.

PS - Donna and Gail think it might be good to do a read-through of the play on an informal basis. If interested, contact either one of us.

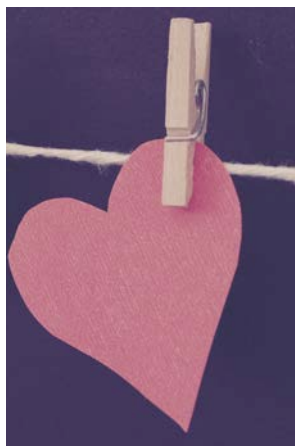

URGENT: HELP NEEDED FOR ROCHESTER'S HAITIAN IMMIGRANTS

In an effort to stand with agencies, groups, and ministries that are supporting immigrants and refugees in our community, the **Greater Rochester Community of Churches Faith in Action Network Voices of Faith on Immigration Team** is providing a venue for **requesting help for area Haitian families.**



Rochester Refugee Resettlement Services CEO Mike Coniff has given the following update about our Haitian brothers and sisters in this area: **Detention and deportation efforts by ICE will increase dramatically when Temporary Protected Status for Haitians expires February 3, 2026.** Anticipating this, we expect that many Haitians will find some way to reach Canada, their only safe option under these circumstances.

VOLUNTEER DRIVERS NEEDED:

- ♥ Immediate need - 5 or 6 to deliver food to Haitians still in the area, an hour commitment 2 or 3 times a month
- ♥ Future need - drivers to get people to a "departure point" for leaving the U.S. That would be a 3-5-hour drive; no crossing borders.

FUNDS NEEDED: (Please make checks payable to Rochester Refugee Resettlement Services with Haitian Families in the reference line.)

- ♥ Immediate local need - \$80 would cover a family's food needs for a week. While that sounds low, it is because RRRS uses Foodlink for foodstuffs and that brings a tremendous savings.
- ♥ Ongoing need - For those going to Canada to be able to register with the government so they can remain and work in Canada, the paperwork requires engaging an immigration attorney with a current fee of \$2000/family. This may decrease if more people go and the attorney then decides the number of clients justifies reducing the fee.
- ♥ Ongoing need - For those in Canada awaiting employment there would be living expenses until they can support themselves.
