Join us as we celebrate the Lord's Supper on Sunday, June 7th. Communion will be served, with prepackaged options available.

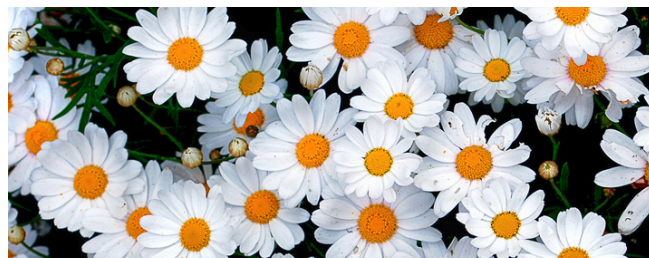

"Meanwhile, when the crowd had gathered by the thousands, so that they trampled on one another, he began to speak first to his disciples, 'Beware of the yeast of the Pharisees, that is, their hypocrisy. Nothing is covered up that will not be uncovered and nothing secret that will not become known. Therefore whatever you have said in the dark will be heard in the light, and what you have whispered behind closed doors will be proclaimed from the housetops.'"

Luke 12:1-3

This Pentecost I spoke on how uncompromisingly inclusive the Apostles became once they received the Holy Spirit, starting with Peter's speech about the gift of tongues in Jerusalem. That aspect of Acts Two was easy to spot for those who read research on U.S. churches. The best-known researcher, Ryan Burge, warns that white, mainline churches risk not only decline but complete, denominational demise when we fail to adapt to changing populations. At the same time, many new, non-denominational congregations excel at including racially and ethnically diverse worshipers. It's clearly an achievable goal. The prominent researcher Robert Jones shows how the influence of white-supremacist, anti-Christian ideology has increased in white churches – evangelical, mainline, and Roman Catholic. This trend was not so noticeable at first but accelerated quickly over the past 10-12 years. It implies that one reason congregations may fail to include more diverse members is because supremacist ideology is a quiet but strong aspect of many congregations.

The PC USA is a good example of both the lack of adaptation and the impact on congregational vitality. Black Presbyterians became a small but deeply-rooted part of our body in the 1800s due to free education in Sabbath Schools, which included children of domestic servants. While some states banned literacy among Black Americans, our denomination centered faith on open access to the Holy Bible, which required everyone be able to read it. Yet Black Presbyterians were excluded from church leadership and even when elected by congregations, often ignored in Presbytery and General Assembly meetings – denied their guaranteed right to "voice," to speak on topics before those councils.

After the Civil War, northern churches raised funds to support Black Presbyterians – as long as they were down south! Many all-black churches were built in support of segregated worship. In New York State, Black Presbyterians were still required to sit in balconies (the origin of the balcony children enjoy in our church). These segregated practices were rightly seen as hypocrisy. Black Christians increasingly joined more Christlike Episcopal congregations, then the radically open Azusa Street Pentecostal Churches.

The exclusive spirit of past Presbyterians lingers in stories and unspoken memories in many minority communities today. This is why it takes intentional, visible efforts to recreate the heterogeneous nature of the first Christians. It's not enough to simply say, "We treat everyone who walks in the door the same." First, we must acknowledge that our past makes it unlikely a Christian of color will walk through our door. Then we must acknowledge that when members express anti-minority or anti-immigrant views without response, we all send a message of exclusion. When I was part of employee-training programs, I would tell widows or young persons who'd never answered the phone for a business: "When you speak with someone on the phone, smile! Your smile or frown can be heard on the other end of the line." The same is true of our individual prejudices – they can be noticed by others even when we think they can't. This agrees with research that finds messages like "All are welcome" are seen as exclusive by persons of color. Today's studies show that many who seek a church will choose a congregation that acknowledges hypocrisy rather than quietly accepts it.

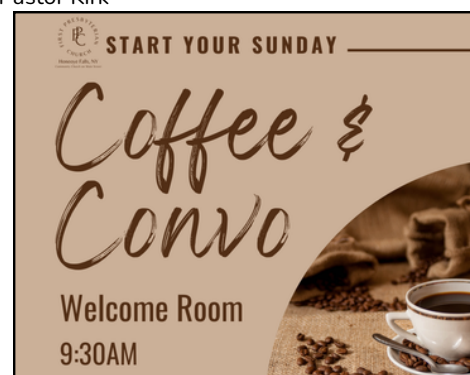
This is honestly a new learning for me. I've always tried to be patient with anyone who expresses racist, sexist, and classist views (I'm sure I also express them from time to time – it's a universally-learned behavior). I've said nothing as people made racist comments about my wife or family. I had no idea that others judge my faith based on my silence. What researchers like Ryan Burge and Robert Jones make clear is that many will reject the church I serve when I fail to respond. This is even more important for pastors than for members, as research shows ministers have almost zero impact on attracting new worshipers but a strong ability to drive people away (what a terrible superpower to have!). Note that people aren't looking for a political view; they're asking that we be consistent to the faith we proclaim. We can legitimately ask, how do those who express rejection based on race, nationality, gender, or income square that with the Gospel? When done respectfully, that could be a truly enlightening discussion for all.

As I see it, there is a much, much bigger issue than whether I behave in a way that attracts new members (though that's a command given directly by Jesus). Part of the example given by

Christ and continued by the Apostles is to model devotion to the Gospel entrusted to us. It's striking how Jesus included Samaritans, gentiles, and even Roman occupiers in His ministry and appointed friends to all in the twelve Apostles. It boggles the mind to realize Christianity was the first truly global religion – based not on birth but entirely on belief. It's humbling to acknowledge that we are the "foreigners" spoken of in the New Testament – almost none among us have a drop of Abraham's blood in our lineage.

I sincerely hope we can learn from congregations that appeal to all God's children. This will be instrumental in the congregation's survival as we look to the next ten years. I pray that God will make me a better model of intentional invitation and inclusion; that I can still be an ever-more-useful tool in the Potter's hands. Most of all, I strenuously desire to see the vision of God's Kingdom – that Jesus shared so compellingly – realized in some small way. The rare times I've felt that Kingdom spirit arrive have stayed with me, reminding me why Christian ministry is the most blessed of all activities. May God help us to realize those moments more and more, and to extend them to all others.

Beware Strange Church Communiques!

Scammers once again hit our congregation. Please remember that if any individual reaches out to ask for your immediate financial contribution, that cannot be a legitimate request. There are restrictions and guidelines for how donations might be obtained, and they all exclude one person deciding to seek immediate help from others.

Some signs that these are scams – whether from the church or anywhere – include the need for an immediate response, that you not tell others about the request, and accounts that look LIKE they originate from the person(s) involved but aren't quite the same. In the most recent case scammers created fake gmail accounts using “pastor kirk” as part of the name. Though I only use Yahoo mail, it did initially fool some people. Please block false texts and tag scam emails as spam. Government agencies warn that some scammers are even using AI to impersonate family in video or regular phone calls; remember to look for those same tell-tale signs of a scam, such as a dire need for money immediately and encouragement to keep the process quiet. Also, you can always text or call me or other church members before acting.

While it's natural to assume criminals have gained contact information from the church, media investigations find that's not the case. Rather, since COVID many churches now stream and have become favorite targets. “Scraping” software allows criminals to retrieve information from online platforms; they then can match names and our location with contact lists purchased from sources like Apple and Google. Matching names and locations provides dozens of opportunities for scammers to approach intended victims.

The insidious nature of these scams can be infuriating. Yet in-person con men and women once traveled to small towns to fleece people, then moved on. Later telephone schemes – including cold-calls from “boiler rooms” that sold junk stocks and bonds – cheated many. New technology allows us to keep in touch with those we love AND increases access for modern versions of age-old crimes. In every age, our best defense is to be aware of how these criminals operate. As Jesus said, “Be wise as serpents and gentle as doves” (Matthew 10:16).

After many requests, it's time to turn again to The Chosen. The most recent episodes comprise Season Five, which spans Jesus' Entry of Jerusalem to The Last Supper (and related Bible traditions). We'll look at the way The Chosen reflects on specific Bible verses in the Adult Bible Study on Thursday evenings at 6:30 PM, and start from church traditions and modern scholarship as we consider their implications during Sunday worship. You can stream The Chosen, Season Five on Prime Video or watch it with no subscriptions by downloading The Chosen App onto your device or smart TV. It's great family entertainment, expanded in compelling ways, and portrays some of the great challenges faced by those who lived in the Mediterranean region during the first century. 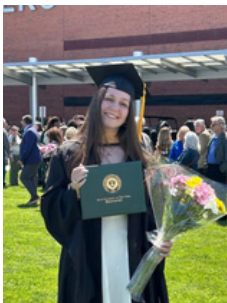
Lucy Neff

The Capital Campaign Team recently gave an update on the Repair and Painting project for the exterior of the sanctuary and bell tower. You might have noticed that the bell was not rung during our recent long cold winter - an inspection was done which showed that water and snow was accumulating in the bell tower.

As a result of the inspection, the Team decided that there was a critical need to make necessary repairs to the bell tower first, before any painting of the exterior of the sanctuary & bell tower would be done. The team has received estimates for the updated project, and also will be applying for a Sacred Sites Grant through the New York Landmarks Conservancy that if accepted will defray some of the added costs.

Presbytery Meeting Report May 2, 2026

Martha Kumler, Elder Commissioner to Presbytery Meetings

The meeting began with worship, which reminds us that this is a gathering to do God's work, not a business meeting. In place of a sermon there was a Lectio Divina reading of 1Peter: 4-10. This is a process of slow meditative reading of scripture during which the congregation listened and responded to the text.

Jim Stockmaster, Chairman of the six-member board of Cameron Community Ministries (CCM), reported that they were financially challenged at the beginning of the year and were unable to make payroll. They have reduced staff, relying much more on volunteers and have reduced costs as much as possible. Because of donations, including a large donation from the Presbytery of Genesee Valley, they now have a positive outlook on the future. CCM is in an impoverished area of Rochester and people rely heavily on their services. They provide meals to 130 people a day without qualifications. Their food cupboard supplies food and hygiene supplies to 30-40 families a week without any government financial assistance. They have a daycare program that serves 38 children and provide tutoring to young students. Cameron can always use volunteers and donations.

John Odom, our Executive Presbyter who came to us from Kentucky, reminded us that it was Kentucky Derby Day and said this presbytery is making a run for the roses as the best, or at least most faithful, presbytery in the country. He highlighted Energy Study and Efficiency Grants, Elder Training, Lunch and Learn programming on the third Wednesday of each month, and Gap Loans for congregations. The presbytery is sponsoring, along with six other presbyteries, a 2-day conference with guest Andrew Root in Geneva in September. Although it is sad news that Christ Clarion Presbyterian Church will close on June 1st, the good news is that First Presbyterian Church of Pittsford will be taking over the building and continuing the preschool program as well as using the building as a mission center.

The presbytery has a new Communications Director, Tamara Hillabush Walker, who will be developing a new website.

Rev. Luke Choi, Church Consultant for the Board of Pensions, reported on benefits changes for clergy and church staff. Among them will be an increase in medical coverage options from three to six.

Committee on Preparation for Ministry presented John Kubiniec as a Candidate for Ministry. He finds the most fulfillment as a chaplain and seeks ordination so he would be able to serve communion and provide baptisms as needed in his work. He also enjoys preaching and has a special love of music. After questioning, the presbytery voted to approve his candidacy.

Mindy Shafer presented the Mission Commission report which included a request from Third Presbyterian Church to concur with the Cherokee Presbytery on the 2026 GA overture 009. It declares that the PC(USA) supports all individuals, including minors, to have access to all medically necessary, evidence-based gender-affirming healthcare. After discussion, the presbytery voted 77% to 23% to support the overture. One speaker, during the discussion, described the long and rigorous process that is followed in New York State that assures the decision to take part in this healthcare is in the best interest of the patient. Another speaker said the medical practice is not supported by science and gave evidence from various sources. That speaker believes that, theologically, our bodies were given to us perfectly. At presbytery meetings, speakers for or against an issue under discussion alternate until the discussion is ended and a vote is taken.

The Geneva and Genesee Valley Presbyteries have held some meetings exploring the possibility of merging. The discussions were thoughtful and each shared where they are currently and what the future might be. Due to many things including style of management, it was decided to put the merger on hold until such time that both presbyteries feel more comfortable with the process.

Committee on Representation (COR) works as a scouting team for presbytery committees and positions. The greatest need for volunteers is on Committee for Preparation for Ministry. Pastor Kirk serves on the COR and can provide information on the available openings. The presbytery elected Brandi Wooten and Whitney Scoville to Permanent Judicial Commission and approved the updated the Permanent Judicial Commission Job Description.

Michelle Allen gave a report of the Youth Triennium which takes place every three years and is an exciting opportunity for youth to participate in the wider church. Our presbytery took 3 youth, but because of small numbers 5 presbyteries needed to join together to go to this event. The presbytery offers quarterly events for 5th-12th graders. Michelle said that even if you do youth group well, there is great value in sharing with a larger group for youth faith formation. Next triennium is in July, 2028.

TE Marcia Rei , TE Evan Wildhack, Elder Barbara Jackson, and Elder Christopher Bensch were commissioned to attend the 227th General Assembly on behalf of the presbytery.

In news from local churches, Rev. Val Fowler said he will be spending three months in Barrow, Alaska as temporary supply pastor. The First Presbyterian Church of Pittsford announced that they have a regular group that goes to cook at Cameron Community Ministries. They are always looking for volunteers. If one or more people from any of the churches wants to cook with a group, they would be welcome.

The next presbytery meeting is on August 4th at 3:00 pm at our church. Please keep your eye on announcements for opportunities to help. This is a chance to show our welcoming spirit and to learn more about the presbytery level of our church.

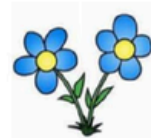
